



# Overview of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill - Fall 2022

## Classification

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC-Chapel Hill) is a public institution with a Carnegie Classification of R1: Doctoral Universities – Very High Research Activity and a member of the Association of American Universities.

## Brief History

UNC-Chapel Hill was the nation's first state university to open its doors and the only public university to award degrees in the 18th century. It was authorized by the North Carolina Constitution of 1776 and chartered by the North Carolina General Assembly in 1789. The first student enrolled in 1795 and graduated in the first class in 1798.

## Governance

As a constituent institution of the 17-campus University of North Carolina System, UNC-Chapel Hill is governed by the UNC Board of Governors and its own Board of Trustees.

## Mission

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, the nation's first public university, serves North Carolina, the United States, and the world through teaching, research, and public service. We embrace an unwavering commitment to excellence as one of the world's great research universities. Our mission is to serve as a center for research, scholarship, and creativity and to teach a diverse community of undergraduate, graduate, and professional students to become the next generation of leaders. Through the efforts of our exceptional faculty and staff, and with generous support from North Carolina's citizens, we invest our knowledge and resources to enhance access to learning and to foster the success and prosperity of each rising generation. We also extend knowledge-based services and other resources of the University to the citizens of North Carolina and their institutions to enhance the quality of life for all people in the State. With *lux, libertas* — light and liberty — as its founding principles, the University has charted a bold course of leading change to improve society and to help solve the world's greatest problems.

## Programs Offered

UNC-Chapel Hill is home to 15 colleges and schools, including: The College of Arts & Sciences, Kenan-Flagler Business School, School of Data Science and Society, School of Education, School of Information and Library Science, School of Government, Hussman School of Journalism and Media, School of Law, School of Social Work, Adams School of Dentistry, School of Medicine, School of Nursing, Eshelman School of Pharmacy, Gillings School of Global Public Health, and The Graduate School. Across these units, UNC-Chapel Hill currently offers more than 78 bachelors, 113 masters, 66 doctoral, and 7 professional degree programs.

## Headcount Enrollment

In fall 2022, the University enrolled 31,705 students, with 20,029 (63.2%) undergraduate, 9,182 graduate, and 2,494 professional students.
